Another good first step is to display the three strands somewhere in your home where you will all see them often. We have poster downloads, or you can make your own posters. There are also some sweet colouring sheets if you want to get the kids involved.

From there, it's helpful to use the language of E Tū Tāngata as situations arise.

Do you hear some negative self talk? Counter it with, E Tū Tāngata, You Have Value.

Is it time to clean up? You can say, remember, we succeed together, it'll be faster if we work as a team!

Time to volunteer to help with something and the kids aren't keen? Remember, Others Matter.

We hope that you'll find this Kete supports you as you bring the ideas of E Tū Tāngata into your home. Have fun exploring what's on offer, and if you have any bright ideas, let us know, we'd love to hear from you.
